The 9th Annual Tintwistle Allotment Gardeners' Association Fruit, Flower, Craft and Vegetable Show 2022

The last TAGA (Tintwistle Allot-Gardeners' Association) Show was in 2019. Then Covid intervened and it was only this year that the Show was able to go ahead again. The Show Committee realised it was going to have to find new recruits for some key roles. This included finding four new 'Judge's Runners'. Their job is to follow the Judges as they assess each exhibit and award the prizes, placing the 1st, 2nd and 3rd prize cards on the right exhibits. This process lasts for 2 hours and quietly takes place in the Show marquees and the main Council room. The Judge's Runners get to hear

the judges' comments and how they reach their decisions. Here is what they thought of the experience:

TONY'S TARGETS

CROSSING FROM CROSSGATES TO FOOTPATH FOR SCHOOL ACCESS ON MANCHESTER ROAD

The pathway emerges in a dangerous position, we may not have the solution just yet but it's very much on the agenda. The current conversation is one of increased signage on the A628, cutting back the shrubbery to increase the visibility of both drivers and pedestrians also, perhaps to study the possibility of relocating the passage exit and increasing the grip on the road for braking traffic. All positive and I am very pleased that the Regional Manager for Highways England is making a visit soon, thus emphasising the importance they place on this issue.

BLOCKED GULLY / STREET LAMP OUTAGE / GENERAL ROAD ISSUES

If you are reporting a blocked gully or lamp outage or a general complaint / observation, it is essential to positively identify the location, otherwise the authority concerned will not respond. To do this you need to use a lamp post ID number or house number/name and street/road designation, the nature of the problem or hazard and any other pertinent information. A picture/photo would be ideal. Anything on the A628 is the responsibility of National Highways who can be contacted on 07922 855725 or by email to: ODYNECustomerSupport@nationalhighways.co.uk

Any other roads in the Village are the responsibility of Derbyshire County Council, contactable on their website https://www.derbyshire.gov.uk/transport-roads/roads-traffic/report-a-road-fault/report-a-road-fault.aspx

A drop-down menu will appear and then select your relevant issue, telephone contact numbers then appear in the text.

In each instance an acknowledgment report will be generated as a record of the complaint.

UPDATE – JUNCTION OF NEW ROAD AND MANCHESTER ROAD

This junction is becoming increasingly used by HGV's and other

heavy traffic, as a rat run off and onto, the A628. The junction was never envisaged to cope with this and as a consequence the kerbs and footpaths are breaking up. Sooner or later they will need a substantial repair. It is being suggested that the junction is widened or fitted with high raised corner kerbs to discourage 'short cutting' of the junction. These work in other town sites, so maybe here too. Permanent scaffold pole barriers on the footpath would be equally deterring and protect pedestrians from the, sometimes speedy, encroachment of these big vehicles? One other suggestion which has been made is to apply a weight limit to New Road, thus barring the use of this road by HGVs in particular.

GENERAL

Over the past four years we have made some good progress regarding lighting, drainage and general highway repair. It's not perfect and it's not complete but it is all positive



WHAT IS THE COUNCIL DOING ABOUT REDUCING THE IMPACT OF CLIMATE CHANGE?

It is very difficult for the Parish Council to make huge progress towards 'net zero', without the support and cooperation of residents and businesses in the vil-However, the Parish Council has an important role to play in raising the awareness of climate change, ensuring its residents, community organisations and businesses are made aware of what they can do, to be more energy efficient and manage their impact on the environment and wildlife. To help us we have Sara Scott-Rivers, our Climate Change Campaign Coordinator and to date Sara has:

 researched and posted over 30 Facebook messages with different ideas for how we can tackle the impact of climate change from recycling blister packs to reducing the amount of water we use

- organised a children's art competition to produce posters – judging to take place in October and presentations to the winners by Councillor Jean Todd, Climate Change Lead for High Peak Borough Council
- introduced a Green Card insert in our newsletter
- started promoting a Tintwistle Green Champion Competition with certificates signed by Dame Vivienne Westwood
- begun organising the Big Green Raffle due to take

place at the Christmas Market on 11 December – all monies to go towards 'greening' the new Community Centre

Maybe you or your family have significantly changed your behaviours and everyday tasks to better reduce the impact of climate change? Maybe you can be one of our Tintwistle Green Champions who the rest of us can learn from? 

St James' Chapel, Crowden



The current Church at Crowden is a grade 2 listed building dating from 1724. The first church on the site was probably erected in 1487. The Church was repaired in 1830 and further rebuilt in 1912. A further addition was made in 1919, when Mr Ben Crossland built the small outer porch as a memorial to the men of Crowden and Woodhead who gave their lives in World War One.

It is now in need of repair and maintenance to preserve its heritage in the Longdendale valley.

As it is no longer a Church of England property, Crowden and Woodhead Residents Association has embarked on a project to restore and renovate the Church and graveyard.

We've set up a sub committee to oversee this project. Our first activity at the end of August was a picnic day to clear the graveyard which was completely overgrown with ferns. We did it! The whole graveyard was cleared by Crowden residents and volunteers from Tintwistle with connections to the Church. Another picnic day is planned on Saturday 8 October to clear out the inside of the Church. Details will be on St James Church (Woodhead and Crowden) | Facebook

We're planning to put up a gate on the road to the Church to deter fly tippers and people breaking into the Church.

After that, several small repairs are planned but we need to start recruiting volunteers and begin fundraising to achieve larger repairs and restoration.

Eventually we hope the Church will be able to be used again for religious and community events by the people of Longdendale and the surrounding area of Glossop.
