View from the Chair

You will be aware that there is a national or international event for every day in the year. Some are very well known – Valentine's Day, Mothers' Day - others are quite obscure and curious. For example, Ask a Stupid Question Day. This originated in the United States in the 1980s. It was meant to encourage children to speak up in class and not be embarrassed about asking about things they don't understand. Or Bean Throwing Day, known as Setsubun, celebrated in Japan on 3 February, the day before the start of spring and the lunar new year. Soybeans are thrown around the house and other places to scare off ogres and evil spirits.

22 April is Earth Day. This was first celebrated in April 1970. Then there were no government Clean Air Acts or Clean Water Acts in the United States. A US Senator created the day to force this issue onto the national agenda On Earth Day 2016 the landmark Paris Agreement or Paris Climate Accords, was signed by the UK, USA, China and 120 other countries. It honours the achievements of the environmental movement and raises awareness of the need to protect Earth's natural resources for future generations.

We think this will be a good day to launch "Tintwistle and Crowden's Green Champions" Competition, part of Tintwistle Parish Council's programme of work for tackling the impact of Climate Change.

TCHAT—what's that????

Over the years residents of Tintwistle and Crowden have talked about the heritage of our area and how it can be recorded for posterity. People like John Horrocks and William Barber have written books; Ann Rochell and Susan and Keith Brierley have put on wonderful exhibitions to commemorate the two World Wars; many people post old photos on social media and recall events of the past; but to date none of the heritage of our area has been brought together in any methodical way.

A chance conversation in Pixie Bakes recently triggered a handful of people to decide to do something about this. They've called themselves the 'Start Up Group'. This is what they have come up with. See what you think.

The initial proposal is to create a voluntary, not for profit association called the Tintwistle and Crowden Heritage and Treasures Association (TCHAT)

Why 'Treasures'? Because that will sound attractive to the children and young people of Tintwistle and Crowden, whom we need to get involved because they will be the ones who will maintain and celebrate our heritage for future years.

The Purpose of the Association: We have come up with lots of possible objectives for the Association:

•Create a local heritage trail with attractive and informative storyboards

- •Promote the history of the Longdendale Valley and its reservoirs
- •Draw up and publish visitor /new resident information on the area
- •Commemorate the life of Dame Vivienne Westwood and her links to the textile and fashion industries
- •Identify a local building that will serve as a small museum, open to the public, that houses memorabilia related to the people and history of the area
- •Collect the reminiscences of current villagers and store digitally
- •Organise and hold the first annual THAT event
- •Identify and secure grant funding to support the objectives of the Association
- •Record the industrial heritage of the area
- •Research and record commercial premises, where they used to be and who ran them
- •Create a mural on Marianne's end wall (and other walls???) celebrating the lives of women of the village and including any currently living who would like to be included
- •Record the history of the churches of the village
- •Bring back the fountain at the bottom of Old Road
- •Record the establishment of the Cenotaph and its history
- •Identify and record the old cottage industries of the area

•Install quality/historical signage as you enter and leave Tintwistle

We're sure you can think of more!

First Steps:

- 1. Draw up a Constitution and open a bank account.
- 2. Make a funding application to The Heritage Lottery (NHL) to achieve some of the objectives.
- 3. Hold a meeting for a wider group the 'Attic Archivers' ~ in other words, those who would like to contribute their knowledge, memories and memorabilia but don't want to be involved in the association's committee work; and most importantly to elect a Committee to take forward the Association's ideas.

The Start Up Group are holding a gathering for anyone who is interested in TCHAT on March 18 at 3.30pm in the Council Offices on Sexton Street – refreshments provided. Please come along!

By this time the Start Up group will have a draft constitution to share with you. Meanwhile do look out for the TCHAT Facebook Group and notices about how you can get involved and share your ideas.

TONY'S TARGETS ~ VILLAGE GATEWAY UPDATE

Cameron Farrell, Route Manager for National Highways in our neck of the woods, attended the recent Parish Council Meet~ ing and gave Councillors an update on the progress of the "Village Gateways" scheme. It is in the final stages of design and they are hoping to deliver the scheme in the next financial year pending any further planning/funding require~ ments identified by the schemes designers and engineers. This scheme aims to increase safety along the A616 and A628 between Langsett and Mottram by



constructing clearer "gateways" into villages, improving and adding to existing signage and markings, reducing speed limits in various areas, and increasing the extent of existing lower speed limits in some residential areas. The aim of these gateways is to calm traffic and encourage drivers to slow down and adhere to posted speed limits, similar schemes delivered in other areas have proven to be successful in reducing collisions, improving road safety and easing congestion.

Tintwistle Parish Council encourages everyone to make the most of these days as an opportunity for the Tintwistle and Crowden communities to



PARISH COUNCIL PRECEPT. What it is and how it's spent

How the 2023/24 Precept will be spent:



What is the Precept?

Parish Councils are funded by a small part of the Council Tax known as the "Parish Precept". A Council Tax payer's bill will typically include a Council Tax charge for the County Council, police and fire services, Borough Council and their Parish Council. The Precept is the Parish Council's share of the Council Tax and is the total amount to be raised through the Council Tax from all the dwellings within the Parish area.

How is the Precept calculated?

Every Parish Council must forecast how much money they require in the upcoming financial year to generate its Precept requirements. The Parish Council must agree on a budget before it can set its Precept, and both must be agreed by the full Parish Council. Once agreed, the Precept is converted into an amount per Council Tax Band that is added to the Council Tax bill. Tintwistle Parish Council does

not receive direct funding from central government and relies on its Precept to fund the Parish Council's work, therefore, it is important the Precept requested by Tintwistle Parish Council is enough to represent the needs of the local community.

The Parish Council has conducted the third and final round of this fund for 22/23. There were 5 successful applications and a total of £500.00 has been allocated.

Altogether there have been 5 rounds of funding with awards totalling £2,795.

This Fund ends on 31 March. It will be up to the new Council, following the elections in May, to



decide whether this fund continues or whether this element of the Council precept will be spent in other ways.

High Peak Borough Council Local Plan Consultation

Every local authority is required to have a Local Plan which describes its intentions in respect of 5 broad areas: Housing, Business, Environment, Health and Wellbeing and Infrastructure. It sets out detailed policies and specific proposals for the development and use of land in High Peak.

The current plan was adopted in 2016. This year the Borough Council is reviewing the Plan considering emerging issues which have been identified. For instance, the outcomes of the census in 2021 have now been published along with the changing population data for councils in the borough. Tintwistle's population is now 1,518 compared with 1,400 in the 2011 census.

Everyone in the Borough is invited to respond to the consultation exercise. Tintwistle Parish Council has submitted a response which we hope reflects the views of many residents. Essentially a wish to retain the rural character of the settlements in the Parish.
