FACT SHEET 1 WHAT DOES TINTWISTLE PARISH COUNCIL DO?

What is a Parish Council?

Tintwistle Parish Council is a corporate body – a legal entity separate from that of its individual members. Its decisions are the responsibility of the whole body. In 1894 an Act of Parliament created the civil parish, separating it from the church after its long history of delivering local services such as care for the poor, maintenance of roads and collecting taxes. Parish Councils have been granted powers by Parliament including the important authority to raise money through taxation (the precept) and a range of powers to spend public money.

The Parish Council is an elected body in the first tier of local government. Other tiers, known as principal authorities, have many legal duties to deliver services such as education, housing, town and country planning, environmental health and social services. High Peak Borough Council (HPBC) is our second tier and Derbyshire County Council (DCC) is our third tier.

What does Tintwistle Parish Council do?

The law gives local Councils choice in activities to undertake. A full list of the legal powers and duties can be found by Googling "The Good Councillor's Guide".

Tintwistle Parish Council serves the community in various ways, with Councillors engaged in daily activities to address local needs. Tintwistle Parish Council consists of ten elected Parish Councillors with one Parish Councillor who represents the Woodhead Ward. The Councillors serve a four year term or until the next full Parish Council election. Your Councillors are elected by the Parish or co-opted by the Parish Council. Key service stakeholders include United Utilities (UU), High Peak Borough Council (HPBC), Derbyshire County Council (DCC), Peak District National Park (PDNP), Highways England, local Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs), Derbyshire Association of Local Councils (DALC), Derbyshire Wildlife Trust (DWT), and more. Here's a detailed list of what the Parish Council does for the community and examples of Councillors' dailv activities:

Transparency and Governance:

Ensures transparency and compliance with government codes and legislation.

Maintains essential council policies and reviews them regularly.

Keeps the Parish Council website updated.

Publishes and distributes the TPC newsletter.

Organises and publicises the Annual Parish Meeting to engage with residents and discuss local issues.

Attends relevant training and meetings to stay informed.

Community and Leisure:

Ensures that residents' issues are brought to the attention of the Council to be resolved where appropriate.

Identifies or manages events for fundraising, such as car boot sales, tombola and market day contributions.

Organises or liaises with community events such as the Remembrance Sunday Procession, Christmas lights, national events, Warm Hubs and coffee mornings.

Building Maintenance and Hire (Sexton Street):

Ensures that the current building is fit for use and complies with insurance policies.

Addresses building maintenance, COVID and other health and safety regulations.

Responsible for the hiring policy for the building.

Management of Allotments:

Manages the allocation and use of 77 allotments on 3 sites.

Liaises with Tintwistle Allotment Gardeners' Association (TAGA) through a partnership agreement to ensure plots meet the standards in the tenant Terms & Conditions. This agreement will be formalised shortly.

Conducts regular allotment inspections and maintains waiting lists.

Grounds Maintenance:

Reviews and manages grounds maintenance arrangements for Sexton Street and Holybank Quarry.

Liaises with the Friends of the Quarry Group to ensure the conservation and biodiversity of Holybank Quarry.

Installed and maintains 10 dog waste bins.

Maintains the Cenotaph planters.

Installs Christmas lights at the Cenotaph Christmas tree and ensures the maintenance of the Cenotaph area.

Liaises with HPBC on ground maintenance issues.

Employs a contractor to support ground maintenance tasks.

Community Safety:

Ensures appropriate responses to community safety and reports issues where necessary to the Police. Maintains working relationships with Highways England and DCC regarding traffic issues

Maintains effective working relationships with local PCSOs.

Works with DCC and United Utilities to tackle flood damage and related issues.

Health and Safety:

Maintains 4 defibrillators^{*} for emergency situations.

Adheres to government guidance on health and safety issues.

Addresses gully cleaning issues and streetlamp outages.

Tintwistle Community Centre:

Manages the Community Building Centre Project to result in a new building by 2025.

Holds public consultation sessions and reports the outcomes to full Council and through TPC newsletters.

Manages design and funding for the new build, including a car park.

Promotes and applies for funding for the Community Centre building.

Finance:

Ensures compliance with government financial regulations.

Seeks to provide best value in all finance decisions.

Manages the annual funding process of the Parish Council Community Fund.

Promotes, selects, and awards allocations to local community organisations.

Climate Change:

Develops and implements a Climate Emergency Action Plan.

Appoints a Campaign Coordinator.

Sets targets and involves the local community in climate change initiatives.

Partnerships:.

Tintwistle Parish Council collaborates with various key service stakeholders to deliver services, address community needs, and maintain effective governance. Some of the key service stakeholders include:

United Utilities (UU): UU is involved in addressing waterrelated issues and collaborating on projects related to reservoirs and water management in the area.

High Peak Borough Council (HPBC): HPBC is a critical partner for local governance and service delivery, including planning permissions, waste collection, and other municipal services.

Derbyshire County Council (DCC): DCC plays a significant role in providing services for all roads management (except the A628), education, social services, and more within the county, including the Tintwistle & Woodhead area.

Peak District National Park (PDNP): As Tintwistle Parish is located within the Peak District National Park, PDNP authorities collaborate on issues related to conservation, outdoor access, and other activities within the national park.

National Highways: Collaboration with National Highways is essential for addressing A628 road-related issues, maintenance, and infrastructure improvements in the Tintwistle & Woodhead area.

Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs): Local PCSOs work closely with the Parish Council to address community safety issues, respond to theft, vandalism, and other law enforcement concerns.

Derbyshire Wildlife Trust (DWT): The Parish Council collaborates with DWT on environmental and conservation projects, including rewilding initiatives and biodiversity preservation. Local Community Organisations: The Parish Council engages with various local community organisations, such as coffee morning organisers, the Bowling Club, the Cricket Club, Tintwistle Athletic, TAGA, the War Memorial Association, URC and Christ Church, alongside volunteers who contribute to community well-being and events.

Derbyshire Association of Local Councils (DALC): DALC provides support and guidance to the Parish Council on matters related to local governance, policies, and compliance with regulations.

National Association of Local Councils (NALC): NALC is a national organisation that supports and represents local councils, offering resources and advocacy for the Parish Council.

Society of Local Council Clerks (SLCC): SLCC represents and supports local council clerks, providing professional development, training, and resources for the efficient functioning of the Parish Council.

FACT SHEET 2 THE TIMELINE OF TINTWISTLE'S NEW COMMUNITY CENTRE ~ "THE STORY SO FAR"

The Vision: An attractive building, accessible to everyone, with maximum green credentials serving Tintwistle and Woodhead and the wider community through a range of activities all year round.

THE STORY SO FAR

2005-2006 Architect's plans were agreed for a new building on the present site. However, fundraising was unsuccessful.

2015-2019 Decisions on planning for a new Community Centre were recorded in meeting minutes 13 times during this period – identifying funding, location and programme of activities.

> STAGE 1 SEPTEMBER 2019 SCOPING THE PROJECT

TPC ringfenced £106,000 for the new build from reserves, from the sale of the old Parish Council building on Manchester Road

Further £10,020 in a fund for furniture and equipment

Parish Council agreed that the 'green hut' needed to be replaced with a building that would serve the community for decades to come

Full Council agreement on the information to be included in a Special Community Centre Newsletter in December 2023.

TPC agreed not to accept the cricket club proposal in its full form but to maintain working relationships in respect of access to facilities.

KEY QUESTION

Why do we need a new Community Centre?

The current building is in a decrepit state and is continuing to deteriorate

The Bowling Club and any events held on the field (TAGA Show, Markets, car boot sales) need access to toilet facilities and facilities for preparing drinks and food

This is the venue used by the annual Well Dressing Group for preparation and creation

The survey carried out in 2021 demonstrated that residents want a new centre for a wide range of activities, some not available in the venues in Tintwistle and Woodhead

The Council needs premises with flexible opening times all year round for community and Council meetings and events and storage for Council documents and equipment.

FACT SHEET 3 CONSULTATION & DROP~IN SESSIONS

The Parish Council has been working with the Tintwistle & Woodhead community since May 2021 on the consultations. The Parish Council received guidance from Derbyshire Association of Local Councils on how to conduct the PWL (Public Works Loan) voting process. PWL voting forms were counted by the Parish Clerk and verified by an independent Clerk. 832 PWL voting forms distributed. 139 were returned. 3 answered neither yes or no and were declared void. Of the 136 remaining forms, 35 voted "yes" (25.74%) and 106 voted "no" (74.26%). However, 72 of the 106 voting forms had been photocopied and then completed. All these were "no" votes. Nevertheless, we have included them in the final vote. Overall, there was a 16.71% response rate from the Parish.



FACT SHEET 4 USES FOR THE NEW COMMUNITY CENTRE



In the TPC surveys of residents in 2021 and 2023, and, as a result of the community consultation events, we have received many ideas for what residents and others would like to see the new building used for.

One of the principles which the Council has agreed is that there should be no unnecessary duplication of activities with other venues in the village. Rather that there should be cooperation as to how the diverse range of venues can best develop programmes that together meet everyone's needs, whatever their age, interests, abilities, or background.

FACT SHEET 5 TINTWISTLE BOWLING CLUB



A BRIEF HISTORY

In 1937, work commenced to create a Bowling Green for the village.

In 1945, Tintwistle (Crown Green) Bowling Club joined the Longdendale Bowling League. They are still playing today.

In 1991, Tintwistle Parish Council installed a prefabricated building, known as "the green hut". This had previously been an office space but was no longer fit for purpose. The "green hut" was acquired as a temporary space for the use of Tintwistle Bowling Club and the playgroup which was active at the time. The building was placed at the side of the Bowling Green on Sexton Street.

At the time, the Sexton Street land was owned by United Utilities; High Peak Borough Council (HPBC) leased the land from UU, including the Bowling Green. In 2007, HPBC relinquished the maintenance of the Bowling Green. They paid Tintwistle Bowling Club a small lump sum and a fee of £8.10 per bowler towards the maintenance and running costs. Tintwistle Bowling Club has maintained the green since then and is self-funded.

In 2008, Tintwistle Parish Council sold their Council Offices building on Manchester Road. The building was sold for £157,000 and the Parish Council moved into "the green hut" on Sexton Street.

In 2014-2016, Tintwistle Parish Council negotiated with United Utilities to buy the Sexton Street land. This included the Bowling Green. Negotiations were completed in 2016 and the Parish Council paid $\pounds 50,000$ $+\pounds 10,000$ VAT for the land. The Parish Council deemed that no lease or licence between the Bowling Club and the Parish Council was required.

AIMS FOR THE FUTURE

The Bowling Club wants to promote Crown Green bowling and for the green to be used as much as possible from April to September, weather permitting.

The Club wants to recruit new members, whether they want to play to compete or as a social member. Crown Green bowling is for all ages and abilities. They are planning some taster session days to get local residents involved and have a go at Crown Green bowling (once the new season commences). They are also liaising with Tintwistle CofE Primary School to try and get the younger generation involved in this family-friendly activity.

The Club wants to promote Crown Green bowling as good for health and well-being, to reduce isolation and as a good way to make new friends and acquaintances. Bowling helps people to get out into the fresh air and move more. It is also seen as one of the cheaper hobbies. The Club also sees bowling as a family friendly hobby in which all the family can get involved, from young children to grandparents.

Tintwistle Bowling Club play in several leagues: North Derbyshire, High Peak, Longdendale and Stockport & District. All ages and abilities are welcome to play in these leagues.
